Dear Parents,

I hope you and your family are doing well as we enter the holiday season. It's hard to believe what has all happened in 2020 and where we were just one year ago. How many times have you heard; "2020 is just a mess!"? We have witnessed the tragedy of a global pandemic, one that will for sure be embedded in our minds and our history books for years to come. Some have handled these challenges like a champ, and others rightfully continue to struggle with restrictions that hamper our everyday life. So many people are working hard to support others and get back to the normalcy we cherish. Every single employee of our district welcomes the chance to get our lives back to normal, and they continue to go the extra mile for each of our kids and each other.

I remember watching TV last New Year's Eve and seeing the ball drop in Time Square. So much excitement in the air as we entered 2020 and thought; "This will be a wonderful year!". Is that just a normal feeling to try and put our past in the rearview mirror? Yes, this year has had additional challenges, however, we need to be optimistic that 2021 will be better. The district continues to move forward, as we know that this pandemic will be behind us at some point.

Over the last several months, we have finalized the design of the 5th/6th grade building and are on pace to break ground this coming spring. The design of the high school expansion (office connection and new fieldhouse) is also complete, and we will soon see construction crews on campus to begin this work. We are anticipating these amazing facilities to be complete by the summer of 2023. There are some aspects of this bond project that will be completed a bit earlier. The parking lot at Forest Grove Elementary and the roof at Baldwin Middle School are already complete, and the new choir room at the Freshman Campus is slated to be done in early 2022. Before we know it, our buildings will all be impacted in a positive fashion, and our students will once again be gracing the hallways of these exciting new facilities.

This December marks the completion of our strategic plan, SOAR IV. With the input of our community and the work of our administrative team, we have spent most of 2020 working on the goals that will bring Hudsonville Public Schools into the future. This December, we will ask the Board of Education to approve the new short-term, long-term, and on-going goals that make up SOAR IV. These goals are developed to define the priorities we have as a district. From diversity, district growth, curriculum standards, and safety, we will use SOAR IV to move our district into the future. Thank you all for your support and collaboration in this work.

I want to personally thank our staff for all their hard work. They have put in countless hours redefining instruction and supporting students and one another throughout this journey. While I try to thank them every opportunity I get, I would also ask that you do the same. Our health care employees and frontline workers are heroes, and I believe our educators are heroes. They care so deeply for your children. I speak for all of us by saying that I can't wait to have them back in the buildings, playing on the playgrounds, walking the hallways....just like it was in 2019.

Closing School or Implementing A Two-Hour Delay?

Hudsonville Public Schools clearly understands the issues a snow day and/or a two-hour delay causes students, parents, and staff. Our decision to close school or implement a two-hour delay is based on the safety of our students, parents, and staff.

We have a few of us responsible for checking the roads and driving conditions well before school begins, during the winter months. We drive throughout the nearly 100 square miles of our district checking for problematic roads – gravel roads as well as main thoroughfares. In some cases, driving conditions can vary greatly from one side of the district to the other. Beginning around 5:00 a.m., I am in constant contact with the additional central office staff, the Director of Transportation, in many cases the Ottawa County Road Commission and local weather stations, as well as other school superintendents. Collectively we discuss the conditions of the roads and what we feel is best for our students. Our goal is to make a decision to close school or implement a two-hour delay prior to 5:45 a.m. so parents can make plans for the day. However, as you know, the weather may become inclement later in the early morning, and as a result, that complicates the decision to close or implement a two-hour delay. In any case, here are the following ways to learn whether or not schools are closed or delayed:

- 1. Media Outlets: Hudsonville Public Schools sends information to media outlets about any closure or delay.
- 2. **Automated Phone Calls/Texts:** We notify all parents with an automated phone call and/or text. To ensure you are receiving calls and texts, please check with your school to make sure your contact information is up-to-date.
- 3. **Email:** We send out an email message to all parents who have an email in our system. Again, please check with your school to make sure your contact information is up-to-date.
- 4. Website/Facebook/Twitter: We post all closings on the district website (www.hudsonvillepublicschools.org), Facebook (www.hudsonvillepublicschools.org), and Twitter (www.hudsonvillepublicschools.org), Facebook (www.hudsonvillepublicschools.org), and Twitter (www.hudsonvillepublicschools.org) are represented to "follow" one or both of our Twitter handles for closures as well as news and information about the district.

Driving a school bus through the snow is not a problem – for the bus driver or the bus. Our bus drivers are highly trained to maneuver in many types of weather and road conditions. Our professional drivers are all very sensitive to the varied driving skills of others on the road, as well. Ice, however, presents some additional challenges. Your child is much safer riding in a school bus than a private vehicle due to the height and weight of a bus. School buses are manufactured under strict guidelines from the State and Federal Government and are designed with high, padded seats to protect students. What this means is simply keeping students within the framework of their personal seating area. This is why it is so important that students stay seated while the bus is in motion.

Closing school or delaying the start is always a tough decision, but please be assured, as your superintendent, I rely on the information from several people and will always put safety first in my decision.

As part of our district P.B.I.S. initiative, students are taught to S.O.A.R. at Jamestown Upper Elementary. Lessons are taught in the classroom, visual reminders are all over the school, and the concepts are reinforced on the morning announcements.

When students are "caught SOARing," they receive a S.O.A.R. dot from a staff member and put their dot on the board with whatever behavior they displayed. Their picture and dot are put on the morning announcements and we contact their family letting them know of the choice they made. The board goes from completely empty in the fall to overflowing in the spring. Students walk past the board all year long able to look back over their past positive choices and work to replicate them.



USDA EXTENDS FREE MEALS FOR STUDENTS

The USDA announced that they would be extending free meals for all students at all schools through June 30, 2021.

All complete meals (breakfast and lunch) will be served at NO COST to children 18 and under (or up through age 26 for individuals with special needs).

What comes with lunch? Lunches include protein (meat/meat alternatives), whole grains, fruit, vegetable, and milk. Students can select 3, 4, or all 5 items. The meal must contain a fruit or vegetable to qualify as a complete meal. Students will still be charged for any other purchases such as milk only, bottled water/juices, additional entrees, etc.

Families do NOT have to fill out additional paperwork to receive meals for free. Free/Reduced Meal Applications will still be collected for the purposes of Math/Reading Title I programs, as well as for discounts on athletic fees, testing fees, college application fees, etc. You can apply for meals at www.lunchapp.com.

For our remote learners, the Remote Meal pickup dates, times, and procedures will remain the same, but all meals will be free. Remote-Learner families will continue to receive a weekly email for ordering.

TITLE I PARENT INFORMATION

Each year, the federal government provides funding for support services and materials for students identified as falling behind in grade level content standards and expectations. District assessment and standardized test scores are indicators of those students who would most benefit from these services. If your child has been identified for receiving the services provided in the building, you will receive a letter in the mail from your child's building principal or staff member. A plan will be put in place to assure your child will receive the appropriate support in order to achieve the academic goals of that grade level or course in the areas of reading, writing, or math. The support received may be short term or long term depending on the individual needs of each student. We believe each and every student can be successful in their academic journey if provided the right opportunities and with the help and support of parents.

As a parent of a student identified to receive support services, you are strongly encouraged to be involved in any of the planning for your child's success. On the Hudsonville Public Schools district website, you will find a tab for Title I. Under this tab, you will find our Board Policy language on Title I parent involvement and your rights as a parent to ask questions and be involved. Please contact your building principal if you would like to discuss how to be involved. Title I information meetings will be announced for you to attend in your child's building.
